Woodland creation

Our work spans the length and breadth of Cornwall. We've planted at 11 sites with a huge variation in habitat type. Crucially, we're not just planting rows and rows of single species to create a monoculture. We are carefully choosing a mix of species and projects to strengthen the resilience and biodiversity of our work. Our sites and habitats have included:

- TEMPERATE RAINFOREST REGENERATION AT CABILLA CORNWALL
- WORKING WITH CORNWALL WILDLIFE TRUST TO CREATE A WETLAND WILLOW GROVE
- OUR FIRST ECOLOGICALLY-SENSITIVE COMMERCIAL TIMBER PLANTATION WORKING ALONGSIDE WORKING WOODLANDS CIC
- SHELTERBELTS AND HEDGEROWS AT VARIOUS SITES FOR IMPROVED BIODIVERSITY AND HABITAT CONNECTION

We're already seeing changes

As we care for these newly established habitats, we're beginning to see the land changing into a new ecosystem.

We're identifying natural regeneration (new trees that appear by themselves) and placing tubes and stakes to give them the best chance of survival.

The flora is beginning to change as we see the first stages of the understory develop and move through its cycles.

Already this is creating homes for creatures of all shapes and sizes.



WHAT HAVE WE ACHIEVED

Carbon sequestration

We are not a carbon-offsetting business. However it is an unavoidable perk of creating woodlands because these green and luscious worlds devour carbon. A single native broadleaf tree will sequester I tonne of carbon in its lifetime – the equivalent of driving more than 7000 km in a petrol car.

But we're not interested in selling capacity to the highest bidder or making it a simple click in an app so that companies can greenwash their activities and brush their environmental impact under the rug.

Prevention is better than cure

We encourage businesses to remove as much carbon as possible from their operations *before* coming to us to offset. This year we have partnered with Carbon Sense who help clients reduce their carbon footprint. When a company has already started to measure and reduce its impact, then we are proud to be able to help them offset any remaining emissions.

Outreach

We had our largest number of attendees at both winter and summer days this year. Local communities are vital in protecting and restoring our woodlands but we need more than awareness. If we want people to care, we need them to feel awe and wonder, and most importantly, a connection to the woodlands. The best way to do that is to get people to spend time in them.

Volunteering creates that connection

We've received questions about using volunteers to help plant and maintain our habitats. Yes, working with volunteers takes more time and effort, but for us, the benefits go far beyond the initial investment. It gets people out in the fresh air, gives them a sense of achievement, and a sense of a community, working together towards the same goal. All of which adds up to them wanting to invest in and protect what they've experienced.

Helping people understand what it takes to create a new habitat

There is a growing negative perception of tree planting among the public. We need people to understand why just sticking trees in the ground isn't the best way to create new habitats. Our planting and woodland wellbeing days show people the process and skills it takes so that they can share that knowledge.

Beyond business

Outside of our planting days and Summer Woodland Wellbeing days, we have begun to expand our outreach with talks and workshops for schools, universities and our partner businesses at their offices. With a combined skill set - from scientific to social - we aim to communicate in a fun and accesible way, furthering the spread of awe and wonder for woodlands. As well as an awareness of how we can restore and revive them.

Although we have strong volunteer support, it's important that we also establish a workforce. We have grown faster than we expected. We now have three PAYE staff, three long-term contractors and a roster of seasonal staff.

Supporting other local businesses

We choose our suppliers carefully, looking for companies that share our values. We work closely with many Cornish companies ranging from small independent traders like Naughty Nonnas and Suzanne Johnson Photography to the big players like St Austell Print and Coodes Solicitors.

The ability for these new habitats to support *people* as well as planet is really something special and important to our continued success and growth.

Environmental

We have expanded our partnerships with other environmental agencies and projects. Working alongside others in our industry means we can go further and faster in achieving our ultimate goal of increasing biodiversity and habitat range.



















We were selected to be part of the MILD ISLES COMMUNITY FUND. This gave us a huge injection of funds to expand our offerings to landowners and partners.

A large portion of our work over the last four years has been focused on TEMPERATE RAINFOREST RESTORATION. We've joined forces with The Thousand Year Trust and become members of the South West Rainforest Alliance.

We've helped CORNWALL WOODLAND TRUST with temperate rainforest research.

We've created and planted up unique habitats to meet the WILDLIFE TRUST'S exacting specifications.

We're working with the Forestry Commission to help deliver their WOODLAND GRANTS, so more people can access and implement them.

We've also teamed up with CARBON SENSE to help partners understand their carbon journey.

WHERE ARE WE HEADED?

The next 12 to 18 months

Now our attention turns to how we build on this success, reach more people and grow more habitats. Our goals for the next 12 to 18 months include:

We're in talks with landowners to establish 14 HECTARES of new habitats in the 2024/2025 planting season. That's around 16.000 TREES – triple the number we established last year.

Build on our OUTREACH PROGRAMME by hiring a community officer.

Buying land and creating OUR OWN WOODLAND HABITAT so that more people can experience our work and access woodlands. This will give us a home for workshops, events and training, and a space where more people can come for a wander through the woods.

Expand our SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH so that we can better understand the ecological impact of our work.

Employ at least TWO MORE PLANTERS for the upcoming season.



These past four years have been fantastic. This last year has shown us what we set out to do is working and can be sustainable over the longterm. We're looking forward to growing beyond Cornwall and perhaps even beyond woodlands (there's talk of ponds!).

All of this is down to our community, landowners, supporters, volunteers and everyone we have worked with. This is a team effort and we can't restore and protect our woodlands without you!
